Plans are Underway to Improve Parking and Encourage Alternative Transportation in Fairhope's Bustling Downtown District

Take a drive down Fairhope Avenue during any weekday lunch rush and it's likely you'll need to circle the block once or twice to find a parking spot close to your favorite shop or eatery. Indeed, parking (or the perceived lack of it) is the number one complaint voiced to City Hall. And yet, this challenge is also an undeniable sign of a vibrant downtown district.

"So many communities are spending millions of dollars to revitalize their downtowns, but we're already there," Mayor Tim Kant said. "We have a unique, beautiful and inviting destination attracting both residents and visitors to this area year-round. The key is to find ways to make parking more accessible while maintaining the charm and green spaces that draw everyone here in the first place."

In an effort to effectively strike this balance, the City of Fairhope, along with the Eastern Shore Metropolitan Planning Organization (ESMPO), called on the expertise of consultant Dan Burden to turn this challenge into a workable – and walkable – plan of action.

It Takes a Village

Burden is the Director of Innovation and Inspiration at Blue Zones, as well as cofounder and former Executive Director of the Walkable and Livable Communities Institute, and has worked with Fairhope city leaders in the past to address and implement improvements downtown. He visited Fairhope in April to develop a proposal titled, "Creating a Vision and Plan for Improved Parking and Active Transportation."

"We wanted to bring in a consultant to be able to make objective observations and to help us put things in perspective and see things from a different angle," Kant said. "While we won't be able to tackle everything at once, he put forth some excellent suggestions to consider."

Burden spent several days in Fairhope meeting with city officials, as well as a focus group of residents and merchants. "We had approximately 100 stakeholders involved in the process and the eagerness from our community representatives was great," said Fairhope Planning and Zoning Director Jonathan Smith. "While we relied on the expertise of the professionals we brought in, the participation of the public in determining what Fairhope really needs was hugely impactful."

Fresh Ideas

One of Burden's initial observations was the fact that a lot of existing parking is being underutilized.

"A prime example is the parking deck off Church Street," Smith said.
"Currently, the deck is vacant for 60-70 percent of the day. Of 180 spaces, 100 of those are available pretty much all day long." Suggestions were made, however, to bring vitality and interest to the parking deck, as well as improving signage to encourage use.

Additionally, "A lot of the recommendations involve restriping, and installing 90 degree parking where parallel parking is currently being used," Smith said. "It's amazing that we can actually increase our parking spaces by 20-30 percent just by restriping."

"It's always an exciting time to listen to new ideas and gain a fresh perspective," said Mike Lyons, who serves on the City's Parking Authority. "Dan presented quite a few ideas to alleviate our challenges. Restriping alone will create quite a few more spaces, and his more creative ideas (which include using potted trees that could be moved for parades and events, and turning the area around the parking deck into more of a courtyard), could have a positive effect as well. It's fantastic and encouraging, what we have going for us."

"There's this perception that we have a parking problem, but in reality, we just need to get more out of the space we already have that's not being completely utilized," Smith said. "Having traffic downtown is a good thing."

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Art on a Limb

Something really different is coming to Fairhope's art scene this September. Art on a Limb, planned for **September 10–30**, is a community celebration of our trees with teams from various organizations, schools, churches, and other groups, each decorating a tree in colorful yarn or fabric.

A form of street art known as "yarn bombing," the practice is believed to have started with knitters in Houston in 2005, and has since spread worldwide, ranging from crocheted boots on historic statues in Austria, knit sweaters on bridges and balconies in Italy, and fabric covered bicycles in Amsterdam, to decorated trees in cities around the world.

Art on a Limb, a fundraising project for the Eastern Shore Art Center, is perfect for Fairhope, said Gaye Lindsey,

project coordinator. "ESAC has done other public art projects through COPA, the committee on public art, but this is a project that many people can be involved in. Fairhope has public art around town and in the flowers and galleries, and this project will focus on the wonderful trees that make our downtown such a neat place."

Cash awards will be given for "Best in Show" for adult and junior categories and for a "People's Choice," voted on by viewers.



A merchant, business, individual or organization can sponsor a publicowned tree for \$200, with proceeds going toward the ESAC for its community outreach efforts. Teams have been forming since spring, and Friends of the Fairhope Library got on board early said Randal Wright, president. "We love this chance to support a community art project and to also strengthen awareness of the Friends of the Library. I'm sworn to secrecy about our design, but we're very excited about decorating two trees on the library property."

Increasing awareness of the ESAC plays a big part in this project, Lindsey said. "We hope that people will better recognize the role that ESAC plays in making Fairhope a

special place, and will support the art center. Also we hope to see a large number of people visit downtown, bringing in business for the merchants."

A Little Perspective

Many suggestions in the plan revolve around walkability and having a pedestrian-scaled downtown and cyclist movement, Smith added. "The City is encouraging the 'park once' mentality, and we want members of the community to embrace that. A lot of it has to do with perspective. You can park at Walmart, go to the back of the store for a carton of milk, and by the time you come back to the register you've walked a half-mile. If you park downtown, you could cover a few blocks walking that same distance. We also want to encourage cycling by providing more options for safe and secure bike parking."

"You'd be surprised by how many [downtown merchant] staff we spoke with said they would be happy using a bicycle to get to and from work if only they had a place to safely secure it," Kant said. "We want to encourage cycling as a viable means of transportation, so we're going to look at areas where installing racks would make sense - in front of an ice cream shop, for instance, as opposed to an antique store. We're also going to take a look at having a fenced, secured area for bikes within the parking deck."



New Spaces

In conjunction with the city's study, the Fairhope Single Tax Corporation (FSTC) has proposed plans for a new parking lot behind Fairhope Public Library to help with the parking needs there.

"About two years ago, we drafted a long-range plan with lessees to discuss what they felt were important issues for the city of Fairhope," said FSTC President Lee Turner. "Two things came up above all the rest: parking and sidewalks. We've already been addressing the sidewalks, and this proposed lot behind the library fits within our long-rage plan."

Once approved by City Council, the lot will add 52 permeable parking spaces, and will be heavily landscaped with gazebos and a central green space of 4,000-5,000 square feet, Turner said. "We will keep as many of the existing trees as possible and events, like the Farmers Market, will have the green space to continue just as they always have."

Plan of Action

So what's the next step? "A few of the suggestions that came out of this study are already in the works, and a few we hope to focus on in the next fiscal year," Kant said. "We want to make sure our citizens know we are addressing these issues and moving forward to make Fairhope an even nicer place to come to."

- 1 A recommendation has been made for the city to work with Faulkner State Community College to optimize parking around the campus by shifting the sidewalk and moving some parking into the Faulkner property without compromising too much green space.
- 2. De la Mare will be restriped to include a center loading zone and increase parking by 20 percent.
- 3. The City Council has approved a site plan revision to allow the parking lot adjacent to the Community Park to be resurfaced and restriped to add 20 spaces.
- 4 School Street will be restriped to increase parking.
- **5.** Once approved by City Council, a new lot of permeable parking spaces will add approximately 52 spaces to the lot behind Fairhope Public Library, funded by the Single Tax Corporation.



Pause for Reflection

A Look at the City's Accomplishments at the Year's Half-Way Mark

As the city of Fairhope moves toward the year's third quarter, City Council members weighed in on the highlights of the first half of 2016.

Diana Brewer said one of the most inspiring and enjoyable aspects of serving on the City Council is working alongside fellow citizens on the many city committees. "Committee volunteers put in countless hours to sustain




"The Library Board is in the process of developing a three-five year strategic plan to help guide the phenomenal growth of our library, and the Recreation Board recently presented its updated five-year plan to the City Council," she said, adding that the Fairhope Soccer Complex is near completion. "This state-of-theart facility will be another crown jewel in our city, ready to serve thousands of our young citizens who participate in soccer."

Brewer said an engineering study is also planned to determine a better layout and design for Volanta Park to accommodate youth baseball leagues, parking for the stadium and practice fields for youth football. "We also went through a lengthy process to determine the best course of action for the tennis facility, and construction will begin this year on six new hydro-courts (clay courts) at Stimpson Field."

The Education Advisory Committee has been working hard to determine how our city can best help our five Fairhope schools achieve greatness, Brewer said. "With the completion of a comprehensive academic audit, the EAC recently made specific

recommendations to the City Council and mayor with the goal of getting the Fairhope schools listed among the top 10 school systems in Alabama."





Brewer added that the Pedestrian Bicycle Committee is in the process of a downtown walkability audit. "These dedicated volunteers are looking at public facilities and ADA access/barriers as they relate to pedestrian traffic in our downtown. The audit includes sidewalks, crosswalks, parks, streets, etc., all with the goal of ensuring that Fairhope is pedestrian friendly."

Mike Ford said the Recycling Committee has been working hard in an effort to increase recycling within the community. Specifically, the committee has been focused on finding containers for Fairhope citizens to use at home to make the recycling process easier and more efficient, and therefore encouraging the movement.

"I am particularly proud of everything going on in recreation, especially the new hydro-courts for tennis," said Ford, adding that he is also proud that the city has hired Tomas Catar as the new tennis professional. "There are lots of tennis folks who know Tomas and know that he going to take tennis in Fairhope to the next level."

Ford predicts an interest in recreation and improvement to facilities will continue to grow, especially as new families continue to move to the area. "I am looking forward to the opening of the new soccer complex and to see what plans develop for the triangle property and the Colony Nature Park."

Kevin Boone serves on the Harbor Board and wants to continue working to make upgrades at the marina and beach-front park, as well as the restroom facilities at the bay.

"I am also very proud of the work done by the Personnel Board," Boone said. "When the board first started on the City Council we passed a compensation study and are now planning to update the study, which provides a pay grade and range for each position with the city and establishes minimum and maximum pay scales for each position. I feel this is a good tool for employees and managers."

Now that the waste water treatment plant upgrades are complete, Boone wants to develop a plan to upgrade the city's lift stations throughout town. He said he was also happy to have consultant Dan Burden visit Fairhope and is excited to see his recommendations implemented.

Jack Burrell said he is proud of the city's debt reduction, not simply because the reduction itself is a good thing, but for what it means the city can now afford.

"Debt reduction is a wonderful thing because that money is freed up to spend on something tangible," he said. "We've reduced the total debt more than 30 percent in less than four years. I want to use those savings to be able to afford all the amenities the citizens want and need – to upgrade the infrastructure, to improve our parks and recreation – without having to borrow money."

Burrell added that the council just voted to refinance a bond issue to pay off in three years, which translates into \$2.4 million in savings. "The opportunities for the city to use those monies are now wide open. This is a prime example of reducing debt and turning that money saved into something the entire community can enjoy – whether that's resurfacing the roads, or upgrading our parks and trails – whatever our needs are, we should be able to meet those needs without having to borrow additional money."

Rich Mueller said he is most proud to be a member of a council that, under the leadership of President Burrell, deals with small and large issues with cooperation, common sense and civility.

"Personally, I have been working on the city's first Historic Preservation Ordinance and, on the environmental front, trying to find the real source of our beach bacteria problems, Mueller said, adding that he's also proud of the recent improvements to the Quail Creek golf course. "Both the new sprinkler system and new golf carts will save us money in the long run. As a councilman, I am only one member of five decision-makers, so I'm proud of all that has been accomplished and look forward to new challenges."

Alabama Coastal Cleanup

The 29th Alabama Coastal Cleanup is Saturday, September 17, from 8 a.m. until noon. Over nearly three decades of work to "get the trash out of the splash," more than 83,000 volunteers have removed more than 1.5 million pounds of trash from Alabama's coastline and waterways.

The City of Fairhope has participated in the Alabama Coastal Cleanup for the past 12 years said Paige Crawford, events coordinator for the City. "On the day of the cleanup, the Fairhope **Public Utilities Electric** Department provides a public power display and the City Gas Department cooks hotdogs for all volunteers. Also, the **Public Works Department** provides an on-site dumpster for debris collected during the cleanup, and the City's

Recycle Committee uses the cleanup as a platform for offering education about recycling programs. We always get a great turnout. Last year, we had 694 volunteers in Fairhope."

Fairhope is one of almost 20 cleanup zones in Baldwin County alone, according to www.AlabamaCoastalCleanup. com. Cleanup supplies are provided, and volunteers who come out early will receive a free T-shirt. Participants are reminded to drink plenty of fluids, wear sunscreen, a hat, and comfortable shoes, supervise children, and be aware of not damaging fragile ecosystems. They are advised to not attempt to remove dangerous or heavy items but to report the location to the zone captain for proper disposal. The Alabama Coastal Cleanup is part of an international effort led by the Ocean Conservancy to remove debris from coastal waters.

MAYOR KANT HONORED WITH NATIONAL URBAN BEAUTIFICATION AWARD

Mayor Tim Kant was honored in June with the coveted Urban Beautification award from the American Horticultural Society (AHS), one of the oldest national gardening organizations in the United States with a mission of promoting excellence in American horticulture.

Awarded to "an individual, institution, or company for significant contributions to urban horticulture and the beautification of American cities," the honor was presented as part of the Great American Gardeners Awards Ceremony and Banquet, held at the AHS headquarters at River Farm in Alexandria, Va.

"When you're recognized by your peers for what you've accomplished in your career, it's a breathtaking experience," Kant said. "To be invited to sit in a room next to people who have written great books, who breed plants, and who have designed amazing landscapes, is an experience that's truly surreal."

Mayor Kant was nominated by AHS President Emeritus Katy Moss Warner, who also serves as President and Judge of America in Bloom, for which Fairhope was awarded the 2015 championship title, among other honors.

"The importance of the natural environment in urban settings cannot be overstated," Warner said. "Colorful flowers, street trees, beautiful parks, well-planted highway medians and preserved native habitats all enrich the quality of life in communities and lend economic vitality as well. Mayor Kant fully understands this critical relationship between plants, people and prosperity. For over 30 years, he has provided knowledgeable creative leadership that lets Fairhope stand proud as a model that showcases the value of urban beautification. He is so deserving of this national recognition."

Mayor Kant has served the City of Fairhope for more than 30 years, the first 18 of which he worked as the city's horticulturist, the first municipal horticulturist employed in the State of Alabama. Kant was given the charter to start the Fairhope Beautification Program, the effects of which both residents and visitors continue to enjoy today. While his title has changed during his tenure, his interest in plants continues from a passion that took root in his childhood.

Kant was 14 years old when he said he was bit by the gardening bug after working at a nursery growing chrysanthemums for the Chicago market. "Although my mother would say it actually started long before that," Kant said. "I was nine years old, growing up in New Jersey, and there was a lady down the street who grew flowers in a hothouse. She would share some seeds with me and I would return to plant them in my own yard. Pretty soon I had a whole garden growing around my house. I was fascinated by the whole process – by watching something grow from start to finish."

Kant earned his degree in horticulture from Auburn University, where he was recognized by The Garden Club of Alabama, Inc., his freshman year and was awarded a scholarship, nominated by the Spanish Fort Garden Club. While he's served Fairhope as mayor since he was elected in 2000, "Even today I love picking the flower varieties," he said. "I have so much fun with it and I have just always loved growing plants. My biggest challenge when I ran in 2000 was the community's concern for who was going




to carry on the tradition of flowers in Fairhope, but I knew Jennifer [Fidler] would have them taken care of."

"Being there at the awards banquet and seeing Mayor Kant receive this honor was truly a career high for me," said Director of Public Works Jennifer Fidler, who superseded Kant as City Horticulturist in 2000. "When you do what I do, visiting the AHS headquarters is like Mecca. It's where the genuine horticulturists are. We were sitting in this older home overlooking the Potomac River and this wildflower meadow, and the moment was just surreal."

Fidler compared the ceremony to being at the Oscars for the horticulture world. "When you've been building your career for 22 years like I have and you find yourself at this event you've always heard about – to be there for the Mayor, and to see him recognized for all his attention to beautifying our city was truly an awesome experience. I was so excited to be there among this who's who of plants and gardens. It was incredible."

The AHS honor wasn't the first time Mayor Kant and the City of Fairhope have been recognized for civic pride and beautification efforts. Fairhope has placed first in its population category in the America in Bloom urban beautification award program, and third in the world in Nations in Bloom, an award that recognizes cities for environmental stewardship and innovative practices. Additionally, Kant has received the Norman J. Walton, Sr. Regional Award—Outstanding Member Government, the highest award given by the South Alabama Regional Planning Commission.

"The plants, the flowers, the landscapes – they're what I know, they're what I love," Kant said. "To be honored at this level for something that's been a lifelong passion of mine – well, it really doesn't get much better than that."

FVFD Explorer Wins State Award

Andon Kingry, a student at Fairhope High School and the South Baldwin Center for Technology Fire Science Program, recently finished first in the Alabama State Skills USA Competition in Birmingham. He advances to the national competition in Louisville, Kentucky, this summer.

"I am so excited to announce that Andon finished first in the state in the Fire Science division," said Kendal Mowdy, SBCT principal. This was the school's first time to participate in the competition that includes both written and physical skills tests.

"Not knowing what to expect, this is an amazing outcome. I'm so proud of the progress this program has made in such a short time. These young men and women do an awesome job learning firefighting and lifesaving skills." Mowdy said.

Andon, who is completing his junior year at FHS and SBCT, says he's looking forward to the national competition. "I'm going to work on increasing my endurance and study more, to make sure I'm prepared. I really look forward to meeting new people and learning new skills at the competition."

Andon is a member of the Fairhope Volunteer Fire Department's Explorer Post, which currently has 15 members, said Explorer Coordinator Tommy Bozeman. "Andon's been a member since he was 14 (the minimum age for joining), and he's a great example of the success we've had with the program. We're all very proud of him."

Fairhope Fire Chief Chris Ellis, added his congratulations to Andon, and noted the program's success over the past eight years. "At least 75 young men and women have gone through the program, and many have at moved up to serve as a volunteer with FVFD. Currently three lieutenants in FVFD who started their experience with the Explorers. It's a great program to teach young people discipline and responsibility and gives them direction."

Tim Blakemore, regional coordinator for the Alabama Fire College, which works with SBCT on the Fire Science Program, complimented the Fairhope Explorer post for its success. "They have done a great job showing young people what firefighting is really about and leading the young people by example. Often, young people see fire fighters in movies and all they see is the 'glory.' They don't see that it's hard work: it's hot and dangerous and you get



sweaty and dirty. Explorer programs let them see and safely learn about firefighting and how firefighters prepare for the job."

Through the program at SBCT, students complete a 160-hour course and can be certified as a firefighter when they turn 18. They may also choose to continue with an additional 200-hour program to earn a Firefighter 1 certificate. "A student can complete that course within about six months after turning 18, and then be eligible to be hired as a professional firefighter by any full-time fire department," Blakemore said. "We don't discourage students from going to college, but firefighters work on a 24-hours on, 48-hours off shift, so we tell young people that they can easily continue their education while working full time as a professional fire fighter."


Andon is the first student from Baldwin County to advance to the national competition. He says that one day being a professional fire fighter would be "a dream come true."

The Fairhope Volunteer Fire Department will be paying his way to the finals in Louisville. "Andon didn't tell us he was taking part in this competition, so it was a huge surprise to us when he won, but we weren't surprised that he won," Chief Ellis said. "He's a fine young man, and we're all really excited for him and wish him the best in the national competition."
