

# **Fairhope Welcomes New Chief of Police**

Fairhope's Mayor and Council Members agree: The selection of Joe Petties as Fairhope's Chief of Police is helping to return a sense of trust and cooperation to the police department. "Joe was my top choice for the position based on his police experience and stated goals for the department and the fact that he's a fine, honorable man. I've known him since we both worked for public works some 30 years ago. I could not be happier with the Council's choice." said Mayor Kant.

Petties' leaderships ushers in not so much a new day but a return to the days when the Fairhope Police could do their job without so much negative attention, said Council Member Diana Brewer. "I think until

recent years, most people in Fairhope did not give much thought to who the Police Chief was and whether he was doing a good job. While public safety and police protection are vital to a thriving, desirable community, these things should happen quietly and without great attention. I think Chief Petties is exactly the right person to get us back to that."

Council Member Jack Burrell says Joe Petties leads by example. "He is a man of utmost integrity, and his thoughts on community policing are in line with the desires of the people of Fairhope. As a Council, we want the police department to stay well-trained, well-educated, and well-supported by the community; these are the Chief's goals too. He also wants to mentor the next generation of police department leadership, and it's always important to look toward the future and not just focus on today."

For his part, Chief Petties says this is not a future he could have envisioned when he was a little boy who would walk into downtown Fairhope to visit with his grandmother who worked at a dry cleaners. But over the past 12 years, as he rose through the ranks to become Fairhope's top cop, he did sometimes



think about the role of Chief.

"There's a Bible verse that says, 'make your requests known to the Lord,' and about four years ago. I wrote in my Bible that I wanted one day to be Chief of Police," he says. "I didn't really think about it until recently, when I was named Interim Chief. At that point, I had worked for the city for 30 years; I was eligible to retire. My wife and I love to travel, and I thought maybe it was time. But a part of me also felt that I needed to apply for the position and just trust in the Lord. If I didn't get it, then it wasn't what the Lord had in mind for me. If I did get it, it meant I was the right person for the job."

Petties first went to work for

the City in 1982, taking a job in public works, but says he wanted to do more than that. "I started volunteering as a reserve police officer and liked the work. I was fortunate to attend the Southwest Alabama Police Academy, and when a patrol officer position came open in 1991, I applied and was accepted."

Petties was promoted to Sargent in 2002, Lieutenant in 2007, and Captain in 2010. For the Chief position, he won out over an initial field of 60 applicants.

"There were many good candidates, and I could have worked under another Chief had that been the Council's decision. I think what made the difference is the way I see this job. It's not about me. My role is about doing what's best for the men and women in the department and for the citizens of Fairhope. I want to see a good relationship among the police, the public, and elected officials.

One way to improve relations between the police and the public is to put more officers on the street to increase visibility, Petties says. "Residents of all ages, shop owners, and visitors need to know the police and be comfortable seeing them and talking with

# **Quality of Life Award**

In a town known for interesting people, Donnie Barrett, Director of the Fairhope Museum of History and this year's recipient of the Fairhope First Quality of Life Award, certainly ranks high among the most interesting.

"Donnie is quite the fellow; he has many talents," said Councilman Mike Ford, a longtime supporter of the city's history museum. "We were blessed when we found him to help with the history museum, first as a volunteer for many years and now as director. He's very talented and has a great interest in and knowledge of history. I don't think we could find anyone better for the job."

A Fairhope native, Barrett graduated from Fairhope High School, attended Auburn University, and graduated from the University of South Alabama with a degree in history. Although he has held a variety of jobs and worked in many volunteer positions over the years, his interest in history has always been at the forefront.



In the mid 1970s, a national tour of exhibits of artifacts from King Tut's tomb set off a frenzy of interest in ancient Egypt across the country, and Fairhope was no exception. Like many, Barrett was fascinated at that time with the history and culture of ancient Egypt, and he created many Egyptian-style sculptures and paintings in our area, including a large mural that he painted on the side of Fairhope Hardware.

Barrett's historical interests a little closer to home led to his work with the band of Civil War re-enactors in Mobile from 1984 to 2000; he also helped establish many of the historical reenactments in our area, including those at Historic Blakeley State Park,

Fort Mims, and Fort Morgan. He was active as an historic preservationist, serving for years on Baldwin County's Archaeological Committee: many historic Indian Mounds and other features are intact today due to his efforts. Barrett is solely credited with saving the original Spanish Fort site and securing grants for archeological digs there.



Barrett's first

experience with a museum was in helping design and build the museum at Fort Gaines on Dauphin Island in 1985 (and helping rebuild it in 1987 after Hurricane

In 1995, he joined the Fairhope Historical Museum and helped build the first exhibit (along with many subsequent exhibits) in the museum's original site in the Bell Building on the Faulkner campus, part of the old campus for the Marietta Johnson School of Organic Education. In 2007, when the renamed Fairhope Museum of History moved to its new location on north Section Street, Barrett was named director. He also serves as curator and exhibit designer.

"When we first established the old museum, we were just kind of getting by, and when Donnie came along, it really got going," Ford said. "He was there when we needed help, and I'm so glad that we were able to offer him the job as director when we opened the new museum. I think it's a job he was born to do."

Barrett and his wife, Lottie, live on a farm south of Fairhope where they collect exotic fowl and aquatic plants and grow tea. Barrett's Fairhope Tea Plantation has over 40,000 tea bushes and is the second largest tea producing farm in the United States.

them. Police shouldn't be someone you see or talk to only when something bad happens. Our officers agree: They know that ultimately, it makes their job easier. They're willing to walk the streets, talk to clubs, organizations, and at schools, maybe even play some pickup basketball games. First impressions mean a lot. If teens gets to know police officers as someone they can trust, that can make a big difference down the road."

Another more immediate goal is to reinstitute gun safety clinics for the public. "A lot of people are buying guns these days, and if they are going to have a gun, they need to know how to properly use it and how to keep it safe so that children don't get hold of it in the house."

Petties is known as a man of the church—he attends Bethesda Christian Center in Mobile—and he says that his faith helps him be a better police officer. "People who know me know what I stand for, but everyone has his or her own beliefs, and it's not up to me to decide who is right or wrong. Good people are good people. I'm going to do my best to do what's right by other people, and in turn, I expect the best from everyone else."





# Fireworks Safety for the 4th of July

Fireworks and 4th of July go together like, well, fireworks and the 4th of July. Watching an official fireworks show is fun and a tradition for many families. But when it comes to another family tradition—shooting off your own fireworks at home—the bottom line is this: Don't do it.

"Plain and simple, it's against the law for individuals within the city limits of Fairhope to shoot off any fireworks. Period," said Chris Ellis, Chief of the Fairhope Volunteer Fire Department. From Ellis's standpoint, one issue is that fireworks can cause unintentional fires. "We almost always get calls about grass or brush fires, normally right after the city's big show but pretty much any evening surrounding the 4th of July. If it's really dry, if we're under drought conditions, it's even worse, but fireworks always have the potential to cause a grass or even a structure fire."

Fireworks are also a personal safety hazard. According to a 2012 report from the National Fire Protection Associa-

tion, in 2010, fireworks caused an estimated 15,500 reported fires nationwide, including 1,100 total structure fires. Those fires resulted in a reported eight deaths, 60 injuries, and \$36 million in property damage.

The report notes that children ages 5 to 14 have the highest risk of injury, but can be dangerous to all ages. "Fireworks can cause all types of injuries," Ellis noted. "They can blow up in your hand and cause serious burns or fractures or even cause you to lose a finger. They can cause compression injuries, facial burns. They are particularly dangerous if children are around, but plain and simple: fireworks are illegal to use in the City of Fairhope."

Enforcing the fireworks ban is not easy, Ellis admitted. "But if we or the police do catch you at it—and we can—it will be enforced, and you will be punished for it. Considering the potential for injuries and that it's against the law, it's just not worth it."



## **Dedication Set for Fairhope's Veterans Memorial**

After years of planning and fundraising, the installation and dedication of the Fairhope Veterans Memorial is finally happening, said Joe Birindelli, co-chair of the memorial committee. The monument and fountain will be dedicated in a ceremony on Thursday, May 30, beginning at 6:30 p.m. "The statue has been complete for some time, but there's been





a delay on getting the granite base prepared. But finally everything has come together. May 30 is the traditional Memorial Day, so it is a perfect time to dedicate this statue that honors all of our veterans."

Titled Tears of Sorrow, Tears of Joy, the memorial was created by Fairhope sculptor Stephen C. Spears. The larger-than-life bronze sculpture placed in Knoll Park overlooking Mobile Bay features two scenes: On one side, a soldier bends on one knee, and presents the United States flag to a little boy. On the other side, a woman walks with her head bowed, carrying a folded flag in her arms. "The memorial honors those who have served our country in all branches of the military, but it also serves to honor the families of our servicemen and women because of their sacrifice too," Birindelli said.

"It should be a lovely, moving tribute to our veterans, and doing it at sunset will make it all the more special," said Sissy Birindelli, chair of the dedication committee. The ceremony will feature music from the Baldwin Pops and a keynote

speech from author Winston Groom. In addition, there will be an invocation from Rev. Lt. Col. Debora Bishop (USMC retired) and comments from Mayor Kant and Joe Birindelli. Lori Dubose of WABF Radio will emcee. Gold Star Mothers and Gold Star Wives will also receive special

recognition during the ceremony that will include a flag ceremony from Fairhope Boy Scout Troop 47. The public is encouraged to attend. Sculptor Stephen Spears, who maintains a studio in Colorado and has a home in Fairhope, has created other

pieces that honor and reflect the military. A selfdescribed "military brat," Spears has a commissioned sculpture in Cantigny, France of a WWI 28th Infantry "Doughboy" that commemorates the first battle American forces fought and won in Europe, and a World War II tribute to the "Easy Company" paratroopers of D-Day installed near the beaches of Normandy in France. In 2000, Fairhope resident Garland Sims came to the city with an idea: install purple martin birdhouses along the bay that would attract the birds that are known to eat thousands of flying insects every day. As Sims explained at the time, the birds' voracious appetites would reduce the mosquito population and the city's need to use pesticides. "Everyone thought it was a great idea and the first purple martin houses were installed in 2001," said Jennifer Fidler, director of public works.

"Purple martins migrate through our area and people enjoy watching for their arrival in early spring," said John Borom, past president of the Mobile Bay Audubon Society and founder of the Alabama Coastal BirdFest. "The birds are great fun to watch and no one enjoyed them more than Garland and his late wife, Scottie, who passed away this past February. Garland and Scottie were always down near the beach watching birds of all kinds and taking beautiful photos," said Fiddler.

"Because of the Sims' love of birds and their devotion to Fairhope, a new birdhouse has joined the 'flock' of birdhouses at the bay. 'Scottie's Inn' is a tri-level birdhouse installed this spring in Scottie Sims memory," said Kim Burmeister with the City's Planning and Building Department. "Everyone loves Garland—he is the ultimate citizen volunteer. All of us wanted to do something to recognize him and also honor Scottie's memory, and we thought this was something they both would appreciate," Burmeister said. The birdhouse was donated by city employees with help from the Fairhope Lion's Club, and installed near a bench south of the pier, where Scottie and Garland liked to sit to watch the bay.

### Free Skin Cancer Screening offered by Haley Dermatology



A survey commissioned by the Academy showed that fewer than one-third of Americans currently examine their skin for signs of melanoma and more than half don't know the signs of melanoma. Dermatologists want to change this because when treated in its earliest stages, melanoma can be cured. If not treated early, the disease can quickly spread to other parts of the body and can be fatal.

"The key to the successful treatment of most types of cancer is early detection and treatment," Dr. Laura Cepeda said. Current estimates are that 1 in 5 Americans will develop skin cancer in their lifetime. One American dies from melanoma almost every hour. Haley Dermatology is committed to the prevention of skin cancer. "We are seeing melanoma more commonly in our area and in younger patients," said Dr. Heather Haley. This is the tenth year we have offered free screenings for our community. # **Fairhope Museum of History**

Pottery Exhibit Opens at the Fairhope Museum of History

Eastern Shore Craft Potters: Artwork for Daily Use, the new exhibit at the Fairhope Museum of History, explores the development of the local pottery tradition from native Americans to working potters in the 21st century.

Thanks to high-quality and abundant natural clay beds in Baldwin County, the Eastern Shore of Mobile Bay has a long, rich heritage of pottery making and is the earliest center of pottery in Alabama Local native-American Indians used the clay to craft earthenware for functional and celebratory uses and around 1830, three French potters, Lewis Lefever, A. Mareschal (Americanized to "Marshall") and Frances LaCoste, established businesses here creating functional glazed stoneware vessels

like pitchers, churns, jugs, and chamber pots that were sold throughout the region.

While there are no known examples of the work of Lefever, the museum exhibit includes a few works of A. Mareschal, whose pottery business was initially near the site of the Fairhope Yacht Club (his pieces stamped "Bama City" are very rare), a piece of LaCoste's kiln from Montrose (a beautiful artifact in its own right), and more than fifty rare pottery effigy heads and functional native American earthenware.





The exhibit also includes pottery from other makers and kilns in Fairhope, Clay City, Montrose, and Daphne, and from Edith Harwell's Pinewood Pottery, in business in Fairhope from 1938 to 1964. A single-brick brickmaking machine from Clay City, Harwell's kickwheel potting wheel, and other artifacts related to the area's pottery tradition also are part of the display. The Fairhope Museum of History's pottery collection and the gracious loan of artifacts from several collectors tell the story of the artisans who made their livelihood producing useful, functional and later, decorative clay products.

The Museum is located at 24 N. Section Street and is open Tuesday through Saturday from 9 a.m.–5 p.m.
