Amy called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m.

Summary of meeting:

- 1. Draft minutes were revised from December:
 - a. FEAB has representation on the Triangle steering committee (currently Nigel, previously Rick Speight)
 - b. The triangle project is still moving forward as previously discussed, no major changes or changes in direction, per Nicole (ESWMP representative)
 - c. Richard Johnson is the key City of Fairhope representative for the Triangle project
- 2. Motion approved: Anna Keene and Steven Scyphers were nominated for membership to FEAB to fill the two vacancies. There is also a 3rd membership application (Vanessa Elias) and she will be invited to attend meetings.
- 3. Nigel has created an on-line drive (google document location) for document sharing among FEAB. All FEAB members and liaisons will have access.
- 4. Amy has drafted goals for FEAB and plans to schedule another Mayor/FEAB meeting for 2023, to go over goals.
- 5. Anna has energy code information for stretch goals, which will elevate Fairhope's current building standards and resiliency.
- 6. Amy encouraged non-members to participate as "active participants" and consider inclusion on any action plans that might interest them.
- 7. FEAB suggests city consider website update and include a place for FEAB to offer information / environmental outreach items.
- 8. City should promote natural nature based features (versus bulkheads and other hardened features) with possible demonstration projects on city property.

9. FEAB is concerned that the City of Fairhope is not subject to its own zoning and sub regulations.

FEAB Minutes:

December minutes were approved as amended. Gary 1st; Jim 2nd.

FEAB Membership

Amy introduced Anna and Steven as potential FEAB members to fill the two (2) vacancies. Motion: Nominate Anna Keene Miller and Steven Scyphers as new FEAB members (Amy: 1st, Jim 2nd). Motion approved. City Council will be sent these nominations for the next Council meeting.

Amy said a 3rd application has been received (Vanessa Elia) and she will be encouraged to attend meetings.

Introductions:

Honored guest Carl Couret, a resident of Fairhope since 1991, introducted himself. He is interested in local environmental efforts. He is a retired biologist.

Invasives:

Carol brought examples of two invasives: Nandina and Coral Ardesia. She has drafted a PSA on a new aquatic invasive, Giant Salvinia. This will be discussed / reviewed at February's meeting. Once review is complete, Kim may share this on City of Fairhope's Facebook page.

Document Sharing

Nigel has sent up an on line account for document sharing among FEAB and staff. Access and passwords will be assigned soon.

Triangle Property

Nicole: she is on the ESWMP and is involved in triangle development plans. The City has representation through her (she is on the watershed management planning team) and the assigned FEAB member (Nigel). Previously it was Rick Speight but he has resigned.

Mission Statement, Goals for 2023

Amy shared her draft of the revised mission statement and goals for 2023, including bios for everyone. She asked everyone to review and offer comments, suggestions. She is suggesting some items from 2022 be removed:

- 1. Clean Marina work in progress. Harbor Board is working with Nicole on compliance items and final site checks. Nothing further is needed from FEAB.
- 2. Community Resiliency Index City is moving forward on this and nothing further is needed from FEAB.
- 3. Triangle Property underway and nothing further is needed from FEAB at this time.

Jim would like to add the Stormwater Inventory Project as a goal for 2023.

New hot topics for 2023 appear to be:

- 1. Native plantings (Carol)
- 2. Habitat and shoreline restoration, living shorelines (Nigel, Steven)
 - a. Nigel suggested Eric Sparks from MSU as a good source of information on living shorelines and potential pilot projects.
 - b. Kim suggested South Beach Park as city owned property that is problematic from erosion of the existing bulkhead; could be a good location for a living shoreline project.
- 3. Environmental Outreach City website (Gary, Amy)

Amy suggested the City website could be improved with more information easily available on City environmental projects and initiatives.

Gary has a technical background and may be of some help.

Triangle property should have its own link on the website; this may be underway. Amy asked everyone to look at the city website and suggest items of improvement for environmental education.

Kim said most environmental projects are under the Planning Dept. page. She agreed this needs to be improved with easier access, a direct location and more information. Steven has seen success with on line surveys.

Amy suggested a potential resource for the community would be for FEAB to have a direct link on the City of Fairhope website with information access on current initiatives.

After gardening with native plants for almost 50 years, I relish sharing the possibilities of benefiting the local ecosystem by including native plants in our home landscapes. As a member of the speakers bureau with the Santa Rosa County, FL Master Gardeners I was able to share my message with others. Before moving to Fairhope, I was active with the Longleaf Chapter of the Native Plant Society and a longtime board member of the Francis M Weston Chapter of the Audubon Society. In Santa Rosa County I served on the RESTORE Council which reviewed potential projects and expenditures under the RESTORE Act and solicited public input. As a volunteer with the Friends of Pensacola State Parks, I led weekly bird walks through Big Lagoon State Park. A certification through the County Extension Program as a Florida Master Naturalist has allowed me to participate in many citizen science projects on plastics, invasives, oysters, terrapins, and seagrasses. Since moving to Fairhope, I've become active with the South Alabama Land Trust Natural Habitat Steering Committee. Our current projects include developing a native habitat certification checklist, offering tours of homes using native plants, a book club discussion group on Douglas Tallamy's Bringing Nature Home, and Zoom sessions with Dr Tallamy. I participate with the Baldwin County Extension Master Environmental Educator Program teaching their Backyard Wildlife Habitat lessons to elementary school classes.

 - PARTICIPATE. The purposes of FEAB regular attendance are:
 - to support Councilman Martin with environmental expertise
 - to speak on 2022 FEAB priority issues as needed (see talking points below)
 - to alert Council and City where environmental issues may be relevant and FEAB could further assist
 - to thank / acknowledge / support Councilmembers when appropriate environmental action is taken or decision is made
 - to inform FEAB of relevant meeting details
 - REPORT. Communicate back to FEAB:
 - Be prepared to present short discussion of relevant items at next FEAB monthly meeting.
 - If immediate response was requested on a given issue, email group directly or contact Amy to help identify POC and communicate issue / next steps.

Talking Points / Messages:

Greenspace Establishment and Management

- POC: Ben Frater
- INTENT: City of Fairhope establishes a network of protected greenspace by 1) selecting natural
 areas to maintain, restore, or enhance AND 2) planning and maintaining areas for compatible
 designated natural outcomes and recreational uses.
 - Many natural area goals are compatible with multi-use recreation goals IF the area is well
 planned and appropriately maintained.
 - Mixed use is vulnerable to failure without proper planning resource will degrade, upkeep will be costly or ineffective (i.e., erosion, weeds, growth inhibition).
 - FEAB has a joint subcommittee with the bike and ped board to help identify new parcels to recommend.
 - There are a variety of means to acquire, control, or otherwise use private property for public use (i.e., purchase and City-maintenance is not always required). FEAB can provide further detail as needed.
 - World-class cities all have intentionally interconnected green spaces increases quality of life and property values.

PRIOR FEAB INVOLVEMENT:

- Dyas Triangle we assisted the Council and Mayor by providing deed research, recommended deed restrictions, and provided several Resolutions regarding possible ways forward for planning and design.
- Colony Park we have provided Council and Mayor with previous Management Plan (Single Tax 2010) and Resolutions regarding recommended ways forward for planning and design.
- Land Use Plan we provided an extensive, detailed recommendation letter to the <u>City</u> and the LUP consultant planning team. We have several members serve on the LUP Steering Committee, and most of the FEAB attended at least one planning workshop, charette, or presentation.

Fairhope Wetlands Protection

- POC: Amy Paulson
- INTENT: City of Fairhope is empowered and equipped to protect local watershed resources.
 - FEAB is working with Daphne and the County to standardize minimum wetlands protection and best management practice language across the County (draft language expected by the end-2022).
 - FEAB is available to assist the review and adoption of revised COF wetlands ordinance and subdivision ordinance.

Coastal Community Resilience Index

- POC: Nicole Love
- INTENT: The City of Fairhope rescores the 2017 Coastal Community Resilience Index (CRI) in light of 2020 hurricane season and other upgrades and improvements.
 - The CRI is a tool to showcase improvements made and identify remaining challenges that could be corrected in advance of the next major storm.
 - The CRI is a Mississippi Sea Grant-facilitated event where City employees and other knowledgeable officials evaluate if their community will reach and maintain an acceptable level of functioning after a disaster.

 The CRI is a step toward preparing the City to enter into the Community Rating System (CRS), which ultimately could result in the lowering of flood insurance premiums for all citizens of the City.

PRIOR FEAB INVOLVEMENT:

 The Council and Mayor have approved the next CRI scoring, to occur in approximately Jan-Feb 2023.

Eastern Shore Watershed Management Plan

- POC: Nicole Love
- INTENT: A watershed-wide approach to identify problems that threaten the quality of receiving
 waters and recommends prioritized solutions to those problems.
 - The Plan includes the Cities of Fairhope and Daphne and will provide recommendations for projects and potential funding solutions.

FEAB INVOLVEMENT:

 Nicole Love is on the Project Team for the Plan. Amy Paulson was on the Project Team and is a member of the Steering Committee. Several members have provided input into the Plan.

Recycling

- POC: Jennifer Foutch
- INTENT: City has functional, reliable, and economical partnerships and a well-communicated recycling system with high-participation rate.
- FEAB INVOLVEMENT: We are available to:
 - Assist in brokering partnerships among contributing jurisdictions and accepting businesses.
 - Assist in marketing and communicating revamped and revitalized recycling process.
 - Reestablish recycling subcommittee as part of FEAB.

Clean Marina

- POC: Nicole Love
- INTENT: Fairhope Marina is a designated Clean Marina and operated under selected Clean Marina standards.
 - Clean Marina is a voluntary program that gives managers the resources they need to minimize pollution.
 - The designation results a "Certified Alabama-Mississippi Clean Marina" and helps to reduce costs associated with waste disposal and attracting responsible boaters.
- FEAB INVOLVEMENT: FEAB is available to assist Harbor Board upon request in selecting
 and implementing relevant commitments to achieve Clean Marina standards. Designation is
 anticipated early-2023.

City Exemptions on Zoning and Subdivision Regulations

Gary had a recent email conversation with Hunter Simmons, Planning and Zoning Director. Gary is concerned because the City of Fairhope may not be subject to local regulations, such as the Zoning and Subdivision Regulations.

Stretch Building Codes

Anna discussed our stretch goals could benefit the existing Fairhope Building Code. These would be voluntary. Incentives would help encourage residents and builders to strive for stretch goals. This could help with resiliency in Fairhope.
